New Path installed at Pangbourne Recreation Ground

So pleased to be able to share that the first phase path at Pangbourne Recreation Ground is now in! Just in time for the sunnier weather. Thank you to everyone for their patience while the work took place and access was restricted.

Particular thanks go to our dedicated member of staff for making this happen and for whom this has been a labour of love (although she might choose different words) and who sat quite literally watching it dry to ensure that there was no damage to the surface while wet! Thanks also to the Councillors who helped in the planning, sourcing and delivery. Who knew there was so much involved in one little path......

Thank you also to West Berkshire Council for their generous donation of almost 42k from CIL monies (developers Community Infrastructure Levy) which has made this possible by funding the majority of the costs .

The path is intended to improve access to the sports pavilion area for visitors of all abilities and access needs. For the first time, there is also a hard surface on the access to the playground from the carpark.... No more muddy puddles by the entrance gate Peppa!

It is also hoped that over time more sections of path may be added to complete a circuit around the rec ground to provide an all weather path for recreation....

But of course that is dependent on funding.... Watch this space.

PSPO – Public Spaces Protection Order-Consultation

collowing on from a first stage public consultation last autumn, TVP Neighbourhood Team have now formally asked West Berkshire Council to start the application process for a Public Spaces Protection Order for Pangbourne Meadows and Recreation Ground between April and October each year. As part of this process another round of



formal public consultation is now live until 30th April. It is hoped that , if successful, the Order should be in place for most of this summer. Pangbourne Parish Council fully supports this application due to the repeated and ongoing anti-social behaviours we often experience at these locations during the summer months. A temporary Order was in place for a few days last summer which helped calm some of the behaviours and it is hoped that a permanent order will give the powers they need to keep the area pleasant and safe for all. *Do have your say!*

REPF Grant – Energy Efficiency Village Hall

GRANT FOR ENERGY SAVING IMPROVEMENTS AT VILLAGE HALL



At the end of last year the Parish Council successfully bid for a grant from the Government's Rural England Prosperity Fund Village Hall and Community Building Grant Scheme run by West Berkshire Council. The generous grant of £6,062 has allowed us to install additional ceiling insulation in the hall and replace some of our older fluorescent lights with LED versions. The work has now been completed! The changes will make a contribution to reducing our carbon footprint at the hall and reduce running costs which we feel is a positive all round.



Youth Activities - Adventure Dolphin Centre





Thames Water treatment Works

Essential Upgrade Works at Pangbourne Water Treatment Works

We're carrying out essential upgrades at Pangbourne Water Treatment Works (RG8 7AY) to improve water quality and maintain a reliable supply for the local community.

What's happening?

- Upgrades to the cascade aerators to meet **Drinking Water Inspectorate (DWI) standards** and enhance long-term reliability..
- Work is due to start on 22 April 2025 and is expected to be completed by Spring 2026.

What to expect?

- All work will remain within the treatment works site—no impact on public roads or traffic.
- Some increased noise and vehicle movements during working hours (Monday to Friday, 08:00 17:00).
- Temporary fluctuations in water quality may occur, but your water will remain safe to use.

A WORD FROM REVD RACHEL JEREMIAH, CURATE

As we move into May many of us feel uplifted as the days get longer, the sun comes out and nature springs to life. Many of us get a spring in our step as we spend more time outside, and enjoy early summer activities in the great outdoors after a long winter. But this is not the case for everyone: for those experiencing a bereavement the world might brighten around them, but all the while they are privately struggling to come to terms with the death of a loved one.

When someone dies there is often an outpouring of love of support, as family and community process the loss and support those nearest and dearest to the person who has died. But as time goes on that support can diminish and bereaved people often feel a gentle pressure to 'move on'.

But, of course, when it comes to grief, this is rarely possible let alone easy. So much of a bereaved person's life is impacted by their loss which will have countless emotional, practical – and even spiritual – implications to their life. It can be incredibly difficult to adjust to the 'new normal' and although the sun shines in the world around them it can be a very isolating and lonely experience, and winter can continue for them.

You might have noticed, on the church's pages in previous issues, that over the past year Pangbourne Churches have set up 'Oasis' - a bereavement support group that seeks to support those who find themselves in this position. Anyone is welcome to join who has experienced any sort of bereavement however long ago and, although it has been set up by our churches, it is suitable for people of all faiths or none. We meet in *The Trunk Room* at *The Elephant Hotel* (who generously support us with hot drinks) on the fourth Thursday of every month (2-3.30pm) for company and companionship, safe in the knowledge that everyone who attends understands something of what each other is going through. Please do get in touch if it is something that could help you.

Modernisation Programme now Completed

The Trustees for Action for Pangbourne Toilets are delighted to announce that the Modernisation of the Toilet Block has now been completed.



Many of you will remember that a year ago the Gents modernisation programme had an opening ceremony with live streaming on Channel 4's 'Late Night Lycett' show to a crowd of around 200 onlookers, with free Prosecco and Burgers for all

The reopening of the Night Toilet was a quieter affair and took place on Sunday March 23rd with our Supporters. Tony Rawlings, representing them, cut the ribbon and tea and biscuits were served to all the attendees.

The backing APT has received from many villagers who became our supporters in the campaign is quite extraordinary. Over the last 10 years since West Berkshire DC closed the block, many villagers have stepped up to help ensure the block was reopened, run and modernised, seeing the great need for it in our community.

The cost of the modernisation has been high, altogether £86,444 for the Disabled Unit, the Ladies, Gents and lastly the Night Toilet. This is in addition to the £12,500 pa to keep the toilets cleaned and maintained on a daily basis.



The current usage of the toilets is about 28,000 per year - evidence indeed that it is a great asset to the community and the health and well-being of all.

Having run the Toilets for many years and accomplished the modernisation programme such that the Toilets should need little refurbishment for the next twenty years, the Trustees of APT consider that it is now time to discuss and plan for the future. This may involve a new set of Trustees or a bigger role for Pangbourne Parish Council or both.

Pangbourne Allotment Association

canes. We are hoping for less slugs and snails this year as last year they had a devastating effect on young seedlings. Mild wet winters

seedlings. The reward for allotmenteers for their hard work and diligence is a supply of fresh vegetables and fruit. However, the side benefits of a







WHSmith

WHSmith, a company which has some 15,000 employees, it will be interesting to see whether our branch survives. At its present site since 1937, it has a special place within the company. The Hon David Smith, a descendant of the founder and the chairman 1948-1972, lived for a time locally. He and his wife liked to visit our shop, and stipulated that it should remain open indefinitely, despite its small size.

The company was founded by Henry Walton Smith and his wife Anna in 1792 as a news vendor in London. With the railway boom starting in the 1840s, they opened news-stands at railway stations. WHSmith remained a private company until 1948.

Since the surname Smith occurs so frequently, one is mistakenly inclined to dismiss it as of little interest. So why then are there so many? The modern name recalls men who in the Middle Ages carried out a highly valued and essential craft, working in iron and other metals. Everyone, rich and poor, depended on the local smith for the most essential things of life, whether in the home, on the farm, out hunting or at war. Every community must have had a smith. The eldest son of a smith was likely to inherit his father's forge, and his skills. He inherited the name of the trade too, which he must have borne with great pride.

Modern smiths are regularly associated with horses, but in early medieval times there were more specific trades for this. For example, the surname Palfreyman, sometimes also simply Palfrey, recalls a man who looked after saddle horses for ordinary riding, palfreys, whereas the man who had the general care of all the horses in a stable was called the 'marshal'. Now the very important Earl Marshal and Field Marshal, at first he was simply a farrier, groom or horse dealer. So the Marshal family, first associated with Hamstead Marshall in the early 13th century, must have risen early and rapidly up the medieval hierarchy.

There are a number of more obvious references to horses locally. Horseshoe Road, Pangbourne, clearly refers to the shape of the road, and the frequent local Horse Leas, as at Bradfield, refers to pasture for them. Horses must have had a hard time working the land on the steep slope at Killhorse, Aldworth.

The breeding and training of horses has a long history in our area. Names like Wyld Court Stud, Hampstead Norris, are modern, but they are echoed in Stadhampton, Stodeham in 1130, which was a 'river meadow (hamm) where horses are kept'. The first recorded racing at Newbury took place in 1805, and horses have been trained for racing at East Ilsley since the 18th century.



Wayland's Smithy

Reaching right back, one comes to the White Horse, Uffington. Not far away is Wayland's Smithy, a prehistoric site associated with Wolund, able magically to shoe horses. He was a Germanic smith-god, so perhaps the name WHSmith hints at a distinguished history indeed!



istory and Heritage are different, the one being concerned with facts and evidence, the other more personal and to some extent based on interpretation. In looking at our village, there will be people of various age groups who remember Adventure Dolphin,



which is a living part of our local heritage. Kevin Dennis has sent me some bullet points and a lovely description of an early visit to France, which I hope will provide recollections to any members of our community who were around at the time.

Firstly the bullet points:

Originally the Pangbourne Boys Club, built in 1959, Management transferred to Bradfield District Council, then Berks CC in 1964 as one of the first Youth and Community Centres.

Early names:

Dennis Horn, the first full time warden, who introduced canoes to the youth club

Peter Overton (more of him later)

Eric Blake, a volunteer instructor, whose father lost his life on HMS Dolphin in WW2, another reason for the naming of the centre

John Fazey, who managed the National Canoe Slalom Team

Eric Radnage, who concentrated on the Youth and Community side and had good links with the local groups

The Journey to the Ardeche in France as related to me by Kevin.

I was travelling down with Eric Blake who had never driven in France before, and he was towing a trailer. When we arrived at Dover it was late at night and we were ushered on to a ferry. We ended up in Boulogne, much to our surprise as we were expecting Calais! It was very foggy and we had no map, but somehow found our way to Calais and met up with the rest of the group. All drivers decided to meet up at the Peage just

south of Paris. We had an exciting drive trying to negotiate 13 lanes of traffic going round the Arc de Triumph, towing a trailer. It is still the craziest roundabout in Europe, not bad for someone who had only been driving in France for a few hours! On our way to the Peage we saw a plane fly over and drop some parachutists, and waited for the other vehicle, a Bedford Minibus to arrive. (no mobiles in those days, this was the early 1970s) It was decided that the other two vehicles would drive to the Ardeche to the campsite, a 24 hour

journey. When we arrived there was still no sign of the rest of the group, and we were low on money as that was with the remaining




vehicle. We camped overnight and agreed to paddle half of the gorge, and if the others did not arrive we would have to return home as we had just enough money to get back. Thank goodness when we came off the water they had arrived and had forgotten to tell us that they had planned to stop off at another campsite on the way down. So we did get to paddle the whole gorge, and in chatting to the other group, they had also seen the parachutists. Intrepid travellers indeed. Does anyone remember being on that trip?

A note from Lesley, I was in the Ardeche coincidentally last week, and it is still a wild and beautiful place, but I was on a steam train, not in a canoe! With thanks to Kevin Dennis who gave me all this information, and continues the good work at the Dolphin Centre to this day.

This link has been organised by Phil Bates who is Head of Modern Languages at St Andrews and a member of the Pangbourne Twinning Association.

Phil has sent us an update of how the children are progressing with their exchange of letters.



"In May 2024 I went to Houdan (twinned with Pangbourne) and met an English teacher, who was

keen to set up a partnership with our school. We started with Year 7 (now year 8), writing letters of introduction. We have now rolled this out to year 6, 7 and are continuing with the current year 8.

The content of the letters links in with the topic of study of the term – so for example just before Christmas our year 7 wrote to their pen pals about their favourite books, TV shows and films. Sometimes they write in French and receive letters in English and sometimes the other way round, so they get practice reading French, too.

Younger siblings in years 5 and below are already asking when they can join in and start writing letters.

It is fantastic to see the joy on the pupils' faces as they receive something so simple, but so tactile and personal as a letter.

We will be continuing this into 2026 and beyond."

The Pangbourne Paddle Sport Club has been

preparing for the Devizes to Westminster canoe race, a 125-mile event held over the Easter weekend. The race includes four categories, with the Senior Doubles (kayak and canoe) being the premier event. Paddlers start in Devizes on Easter Saturday and paddle non-stop to Westminster Bridge in London, facing challenges such as timing their arrival with the outgoing tide at Teddington and navigating over 50 portages. This year, the club will be represented by experienced paddlers like Vicky Metcalfe and Peter Walker, both members of the DW 1000 mile club, and Donald Fisher-Jeffes, who will be competing in the senior singles for the first time. Many club members also volunteer as marshals. Membership is open to those with the Paddle UK Discover award, with sessions held on Saturday and Sunday mornings and Tuesday and Thursday evenings. The club will also host its annual river clean on Sunday, June 1st, in conjunction with Paddle UK, a Summer Regatta on Saturday, June 21st, and the Annual Hasler Canoe Marathon on Sunday, September 21st.

The climbing section continues to thrive, with increasing student enrollment. The climbing team has secured grants from various local organizations, including Pangbourne Parish Council, The Good Exchange, Tesco Stronger Starts, and the Coop, to enhance their equipment. They are also supporting a young helper to become a qualified Climbing Wall Instructor.

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award program has over 80 individuals planning their summer expeditions, supported by 15 volunteers. Five Bronze teams have completed a navigation and teamwork exercise and will undertake their practice and qualifying expeditions locally. The five Silver canoe teams have completed a rescue and safety course and will have water-based training over the Easter holidays, aiming for their expeditions on the River Thames. A walking team is also participating for the first time in many years. At the Gold level, four water-based expedition teams have completed safety and rescue training. They will conduct their final training on the Thames before their 4-day practice and qualifying expeditions on the rivers Wye and Severn. The volunteering efforts of this year's participants have totaled over 2000 hours in the community. The Trustees have allocated over £1600 for assisted places, and the Reading Rotary Club has provided a £1000 grant for new tents.

Preparations for the summer have included water-based coaching sessions covering safety, rescue, and kayak rolling, along with competence assessments. Several team members have updated their first aid and safeguarding qualifications. The Trustees are supporting three team members taking their coaching exams.

As the Centre's activities expand, they are seeking new Trustees. The Trustees meet six times a year. Interested individuals can email *info@ adventuredolphin.co.uk*

The Centre is working to secure a lease for their building with West Berkshire Council and is in discussions with the National Trust and Pangbourne Parish Council to increase boat storage. Nino will also be returning with his coffee and ice cream airstream.





■ hat a difference in the village over the last couple of weeks. Sunshine following the rain has brought all the spring plants and flowers on. They are a pleasure to see in our gardens but also as we walk around Pangbourne, it's not only our private gardens which are bursting into life but also our public spaces. The daffodils in the planter outside the Police Station, a new garden by the side of the Co-op and as always, the wall around the Village Hall car park are just a few and are all a pleasure to see. There are many more. They are uplifting and give us a sense of "Pangbourne Pride" as we go about the village. Thank you to the people who give their time to make Pangbourne a pleasant place in which to live and to visit.



In March we held our Wildlife Friendly Gardening event in the village hall. It was good to see so many interested people, and as the presentation was so rich with good ideas for all of us we include the following report of the event written by Linda Joannou:

The evening was led by Emily and Mel of Branchways Gardening who presented on Wildlife-Friendly Gardening. They are local gardeners, based in Whitchurch, who design and manage gardens with wildlife in mind. Here is a summary of their advice: "What do we mean by wildlife and do we really like all of it? What wildlife do we desire in our own gardens?" We all like to encourage the 'good' wildlife, e.g. birds, butterflies, hedgehogs, but we are not so keen on the 'bad' wildlife, e.g. deer, slugs and mice. However fashions change and we are beginning to understand the important role of all wildlife: for example, wasps are good pollinators and there is even a 'good' slug - the leopard slug that eats other slugs! But there is a need for harmonious balance. The 'bullies' must be stopped from taking

over the playground and tough decisions must be made on how to control them. The first step in natural gardening is to stop using chemicals. By doing something simple as not spraying the greenfly on your roses, then other creatures such as ladybirds and blue tits will turn up and eat them. There are many alternatives to using chemicals for example: Neem Oil - mixed with a gentle soap and sprayed onto plants, this kills small soft-bodied insects like aphids & whitefly. And you can hand-pick slugs (and throw them in the compost heap!) Don't give up gardening even in a wild garden. There will always be some maintenance, both to ensure continuity and also to avoid garden 'thugs' taking over. You will still need to clear out brambles, nuisance weeds and unwanted sycamore seedlings before they become established.

There are four basic layers to a garden ecosystem: Soil, Groundcover, Shrubs and Trees

- 1. Soil It is important to determine the type of soil in your garden, e.g. sand, clay, silt. This will help you choose the plants that will grow best in your garden. There is a website called Soilscapes Viewer which gives detailed information on the soil in your garden. Note you won't necessarily have the same soil as your next door neighbour! Regularly mulching your garden will improve the soil structure, nutrient levels, retain moisture and suppress weeds. Types of organic mulching include: Bark longest lasting Garden Compost try to compost all your organic garden waste. Recycle sticks and twigs into a 'dead hedge'. Manure available from various suppliers. Branchways use Apsley Farms manure.
- 2. Groundcover Ground cover will add diversity, enjoyment, interest and nectar. Also, it will help to discourage weeds. It can also be used as an alternative to grass e.g. creeping thyme. Consider introducing a wildflower meadow/area into your garden. With wildflower lawns, generally the poorer the soil the better. Grow your own flowers from seeds in pots or trays and plant them into soil that has been forked over (and not fertilised). Or you can buy wildflower plugs (available from Nature Scape). Sprinkling wild flower seed onto existing grass doesn't work. Try to suppress coarse grass as this will take over and the wild flowers will disappear. Yellow Rattle is a semi-

parasite of grass and will help to prevent it from getting out of control. Notice your weeds - these are good indicators of the ecology and what will grow well in your garden. These are 'free' plants often valued for their herbal remedies and as food. All cultivated plants originated at some point from its wild ancestor.

- **3. Shrubs** Shrubs add diversity, space and density. A mixed hedge of fruiting and berrying shrubs will provide food and shelter for birds, insects and mammals. But all will require regular maintenance (pruning) to keep them healthy and in shape.
- 4. Trees need space but will add structure, shade, colour, and all year round interest. Most gardens will have room for a tree. It will be a home for nature. A place for birds to perch, roost and nest in. However, as with shrubs, trees will require regular maintenance.

The human dimension: Plan to avoid conflicts. What do you and your family want from the garden? Try to plan for an area for leisure, play

and wildlife. Make it useful e.g. grow vegetables, flowers for the house. Share cuttings with your friends. Use neighbourhood plants as screening for your own. Finally, with wildlife, there is always something to watch and to interest the whole family - it can even become educational!

Finally as we reflect on the ways in which we can preserve and grow our diversity we need to think about how Pangbourne has changed over recent years. The increase in car ownership and usage has meant a loss of front gardens and a loss of peace in the village as there seems to be a constant queue of traffic rumbling through village. Our pavements are seriously degraded because of parked cars, and years of being dug up by various utility companies and the village is in great need of pavement repair. More flowers and green benefit our biodiversity and bring a smile to our faces, but this needs to go hand in hand with a project to improve the ground under our feet. Hopefully this is on Pangbourne Parish Council's agenda!

Reading RSPB Group Activities

On 12 March we were delighted to welcome back Peter Holden MBE for the second part of his talk

entitled "Inspired by Birds", after enjoying the first part in February 2024.

In this second part Peter looked at the many ways in which artists, writers and composers have been inspired by birds from the 19th century until the present day, starting with John Gould who assisted Darwin in cataloguing the collections he brought back from his voyage on the Beagle and who produced 5 volumes on the Birds of the British Isles, as well as volumes on the Birds of Australia and Asia. All the 280,00 illustrations in his books were lithographs which were painstakingly coloured by hand which, as he himself commented "will most likely cause some astonishment." In 2008 a collection of his books sold for £1.25 million.

Poets including Milton, Coleridge, Shelley, Keats and Ted Hughes drew inspiration from birds but perhaps the one who was most obviously deeply connected with nature was John Clare (1793-1864) who described himself as the "peasant poet" and whose work as an agricultural labourer put him in daily contact with the natural world. His poem describing the song of the Nightingale is perhaps the closest anyone has come to expressing in words what the song sounds like.

Some artists have had a major impact in helping organisations such as the RSPB and WWT to promote the need for conservation. Notable among these artists was Sir Peter Scott who founded the WWT and established the Slimbridge Wildfowl and Wetlands reserve, the first of several important havens for resident and migrating wildfowl and waders. Others were instrumental in inspiring the next generation, not least Charles Tunnicliffe whose series of Brook Bond tea cards of birds were collected by many children, and many in the audience could still remember the excitement of opening a packet of tea to see whether the card was one they didn't yet have in their collection. Tunnicliffe also illustrated the Ladybird nature books.

When Tunnicliffe retired, he was replaced at the RSPB by Robert Gillmore who lived in Reading

for many years before moving to Norfolk.

Peter gave us a brief insight into some of the music inspired by birds and one particularly striking example was the BBC's first ever outside broadcast in 1927 to record Beatrice Harrison, a famous cellist who used to play in her garden in Surrey at night and found that the sound of her cello encouraged the local Nightingales to start singing. Peter played us a short section of this recording. After Beatrice left the Surrey, the BBC continued to record the Nightingales and in 1944 picked up the sound of bombers flying in and out on night missions providing a haunting background to the beauty of the Nightingale's song.

On Sunday 16th March we went for a walk round Fleet Pond, a large lake where we saw many ducks, swans and a few geese. The woods round the lake held many woodland birds with two Great Spotted Woodpeckers and a Treecreeper being highlights. In the reeds we had good views of a Great White Egret.

Tuesday 18th March saw a group of us meet up at The Lookout in Swinley Forest where we walked to Caesar's Camp and back. It was a cold sunny day, but we did see a Red Admiral butterfly along with a Chiffchaff singing, showing that Spring is coming. At Caesar's Camp we found a pair of Stonechats and could hear occasional bursts of song from a Dartford Warbler deep in the heather. We tried for a long time to spot them, only getting the odd brief sighting. So eventually we had to admit defeat and head back to the car park, but on the way a male Dartford Warbler sat on the top of a small pine against the blue sky, and we all got an excellent view of it.

Outdoor trips in April include a walk on Sunday 13 April at Aston Rowant looking for woodland and farmland birds and a visit to Blackbushe and Yateley Common on Wednesday 23 April.

May will get off to a flying start with a Dawn Chorus Walk at Clayfield Copse in Caversham on 4 May. This will be followed on 13 May by a short AGM and then a talk by Ben Andrew on his work as RSPB Picture Researcher.

On Sundy 18 May there will be a minibus trip to RSPB Pulborough Brooks in West Sussex and on 20 May there will be a morning walk at Fobney Island Nature Reserve on the Kennet.

All indoor meetings are held in Pangbourne Village Hall starting at 8pm. Visitors are very welcome. There is an entrance fee of £5 for nonmembers, junior's half price. New members are always welcome with annual membership set at a modest £15 (£10 for juniors).


